Since its inception, Jatan has been committed to empowering rural and urban youth, adolescents, children and women, elected women representatives, migrant workers, and underprivileged sections of society through a wide range of programmes to promote informed participation and mainstreaming them on issues related to health, education, employment, skill development, migration, and maternal and reproductive health.

## **Mission**

Jatan strives to empower the youth of Rajasthan by providing them with information, support, and proper opportunities so that they drive positive change in society.

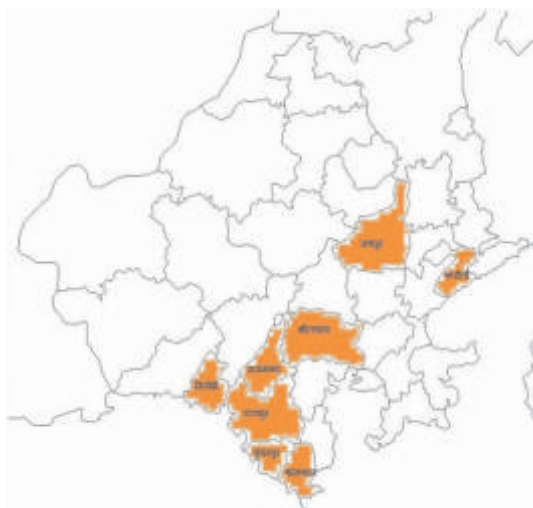

## From the Pen of the Director

The 2022-2023 year started with a new wave of projects and workers that brought palpable, fresh energy we all drew from for the year ahead. In both the Udaipur office and our field offices, new workers joined with great enthusiasm and took on their work with great responsibility. This year we saw a lot of change at every level of our organization: from the field workers to the main office, from accounting to human resource management, in programs and activities, and even in the funding agencies and their administering methods. The participation of these agencies in their programmes has increased and their monitoring has become more active than before. The monitoring system has become stronger through the process of engaging in the field. Technology, mobile phones, and new apps have increased the importance of information and data management. Now reporting is being done with the use of location proof technology, the advantages and disadvantages of which are a separate topic, but here it is notable that the work of Jatan has been affected by these changes. These changes have necessitated visible changes in the structuring of our organization. Some of our established rhythms have helped us to flourish in this year of change. As always, we successfully organized Jatan's two major celebrations, Foundation Day and the Annual Capacity Camp for Workers. These are two important opportunities for staff from across the organization to interact, to get acquainted with the values and culture of Jatan, and to increase their knowledge on new topics, which are selected and organized jointly by all the workers.

From a geographic point of view, this year we had to wrap up our work after completing the Gyanodya project in Karoli District while we also announced the start of our work in Banswara and Sirohi Districts under the vaccination project of USAID. Currently, we are working in Rajsamand, Udaipur, Dungarpur, Jaipur, Banswara and Sirohi Districts of Rajasthan, engaging about 200 villages of these districts through various projects.

This year also brought an opportunity to implement our ideas on a larger scale. Our efforts to include issues like gender and positive masculinity in the state-level curriculum have been successful. We also prepared a group of skilled trainers to disseminate this curriculum. Jatan was also recognized and honored at the state level by the Department of Health for the cooperation we provided in their Covid-19 vaccination program. At the national level, Jatan was invited to share its work and experiences in pre-school education at the Paalan 1000 national seminar, part of the national campaign of the same name supported by the Bernard van Leer Foundation. Similarly, we were invited to present our work in the national seminar "Gender and Masculinity" organized by UNICEF and Rohini Nilekar Philanthropy in Mumbai. There we were able to present our work from a large platform.

The time has come for the thinking and learning we have done at Jatan, thus invitations to such platforms present increased opportunities for the organization as well as a sense of achievement.

## For Better Parenting: Urban 95 Udaipur: Phase 2

Collaboration - Bernard Vanlier Foundation and Udaipur Municipal Corporation

The Urban 95 programme conceptualises what a city should be like from the perspective of a healthy 3-year-old child (whose average height is 95 centimetres). The project aims to create a healthy, safe, and inspirational environment for young children, their parents, and all other caretakers.

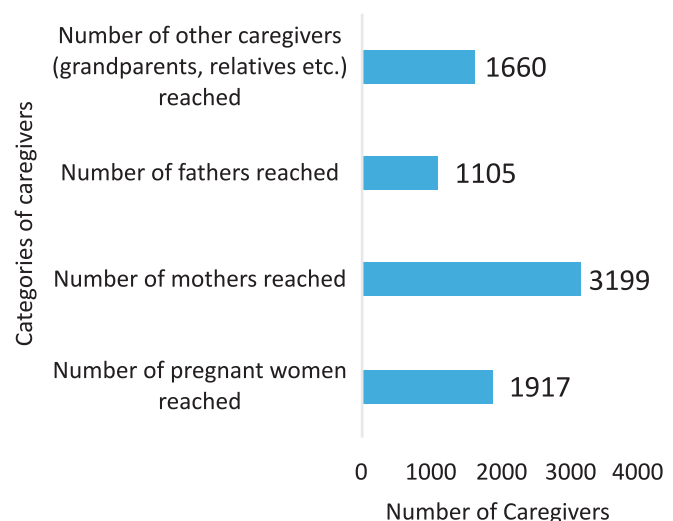
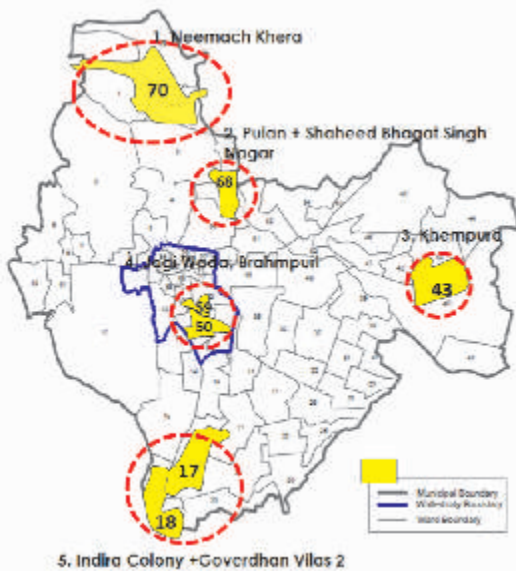

# Jatan's Holistic Child Development: Khushi Project Rajsamand

Sponsor: Hindustan Zinc Limited

Run by Jatan Sansthan and Hindustan Zinc Limited, this project is a meaningful effort for the holistic development of children by empowering 509 anganwadi centers to become model daycare centers in Railmagra, Rajsamand, and Khamnor blocks of Rajsamand District. The aim of the project is to strengthen the 6 core services provided by the Integrated Child Development Scheme for Anganwadi Centres: providing complete supplementary nutrition, smooth implementation of pre-school education, referral facilities, improving health & hygiene of children, ensuring immunization, and increasing community participation. ## Key Activities

- Malnutrition tests were conducted on 25,778 children in the age group 0-5 years. Out of these, 148 severely malnourished children were identified and referred to the malnutrition treatment centre. The Khushi team coordinated with a doctor to provide constant support for these children including ensuring ambulance transport, hospital admission, tests, blood donations, food arrangements, and counselling. This collaboration led to increased hospital stays for these children to ensure proper care.
- The community-based malnutrition management program was inaugurated by the Honorable District Collector Neelabh Saxena at the Kunwaria Nandghar Anganwadi Center in Rajsamand. This was followed by CMM OTP camps being organized in 103 Gram Panchayats in all three blocks of the district to connect registered children with essential health services.
- To improve the eating habits of the malnourished and severely malnourished boys and girls identified in the project area and bring them to normal condition, 13 days of Positive Deviance camps were organized in 100 Gram Panchayats of all three blocks. Pregnant women, lactating mothers, parents, and caretakers were also linked to this program. In the camps, training was given on important topics like cooking different types of tasty dishes from locally available food

materials and the feeding, cleanliness, and care of children.

- In all three blocks, the workers, ANMs and supervisors were trained on important topics like CMAM, children's weight and height, use of MUAC tape (module 8), and pre-school education. Along with this, health assessments of the children receiving pre-school education were completed.
- The concept of kitchen garden (nutrition garden) was developed, for which seeds were distributed twice a year. 3 to 4 varieties of seasonal vegetables were planted near the homes and farms of pregnant women, lactating mothers, and families of malnourished children for easy access to healthy, fresh food.
- Quality pre-school education activities were conducted at 509 anganwadi centres with the aim of language development, cognitive development, creative development, physical development, social development, emotional development, and empathy development in children in the age

group of 3-6 years. Pre-school education kits were prepared and used to improve listening, speaking, and writing skills of the children.

- A variety of efforts were made to connect the community with anganwadi centres. As a result, essential items like milk, biscuits, fruits, vegetables, toys, water coolers, campers, shoes, slippers, school dresses etc. started being donated from the community for the children. Most people were interested in donating school materials, warm clothes, and food items. Some community members decided to celebrate their birthdays with the children at the anganwadis. Moreover, others helped in repairing the anganwadi buildings and floors or in providing swings, stools, chairs, etc for the children.
- From 24-30 April 2022, World Immunization Week was celebrated in the anganwadis of Khamnor, Rajsamand and Railmagra blocks where people were encouraged to get vaccinated. Similarly, from 1-7 August 2022 celebrations and activities were organized at 31 nandghar anganwadi centers for World Breastfeeding Week and the whole month of September was celebrated in all angandwadis for Nutrition Month.
- Anganwadi Supervision Committees were formed to make anganwadi centres more effective. These committees received and reviewed proposals for necessary repairs, electrical and water problems, painting, etc. and conducted follow up to ensure the completion of the work at the Gram Panchayat or community level. They also oversaw the distribution of dry ration material and the social audit while also ensuring increased participation in parent meetings.
- Monthly parent meetings were organized at all anganwadi centers. In these meetings, important issues like health, nutrition, seasonal diseases, vaccination, cleanliness, enrolment of children, retention of enrolled children, and consistent attendance of children who come irregularly were discussed.

District Level Nutrition Fair: "Khushi Poshan Mela" was organized in Rajsamand on 22 March 2023. Various entertaining and creative activities related to health and nutrition were organized for anganwadi workers, adolescents, and local women, in which everyone participated enthusiastically. In the fair, emphasis was laid on the need to make special efforts to increase the utility of THR given to the community and to reduce the level of malnutrition in the district through joint efforts of all. About 600 people including members from the Department of Women and Child Development, Department of Health, Hindustan Zinc, partner organizations, as well as anganwadi workers and local citizens from Rajsamand District participated in the Nutrition Fair.



In March 2023, Priya Agarwal Hebbar of Vedanta Group met the children of Morra village's nandghar anganwadi in Railmagra. She also met the Anganwadi Management Committee members and Jatan team and appreciated the project work.

# A World of their Own: Apna Jatan Kendra

## Collaboration: Gebeco, Germany and Indo Asia Travel

Apna Jatan Center was started in October 2010 in Neemach Mata Kachchi Basti (Dewali) area of Udaipur city. This centre helps to meet the educational, emotional, and creative development needs of underprivileged children. To connect underprivileged and drop out children to mainstream education, classes are organized on various subjects like Hindi, Maths, English, Science, Social Knowledge, Sanskrit and Social Awareness. In addition to this, art, crafts, and sports activities are organized every Tuesday and Saturday. School-going children from the area also come for free tutoring on these subjects in the afternoon. This year a total of 50 children were enrolled at the center. Nutritional food and snacks are also provided to children who attend the center's activities.

### Learning through Play

This year children enjoyed many upcycling craft activities and made a variety of projects such as photo frames, bouquets, origami, butterflies, rabbits, etc. Many of their crafts were used to decorate the cupboards and walls of the center. The children enjoyed a wide variety of games like carrom, snakes and ladders, ball pass, jump rope, badminton, ring, kabaddi, games that involve listening, understanding, and giving a positive response, etc. The games are designed and conducted to support the physical, intellectual, and mental abilities of the children as well as inspire a team spirit.

### Storytelling Sessions

Keeping in mind the objectives of language development and expression, story listening sessions are organized every day from 3 pm to 3:45 pm. The children are divided into 3 groups and take turns reading stories expressively with gestures and acting. In these sessions, all the children participate in reading and narrating different stories.

### From Bicycling to Recycling – Gardening Sessions

Gardening and environment sessions are held with the children every Thursday. For this, an agricultural/creative education expert comes and teaches children how to make compost, sow seeds in the soil, the process of a seed growing into a plant, how much to water the plants, etc.

As a part of these session, this year two interns, Ned and Isabel, together taught the children how to make red, yellow, green and blue colored herbal powders for Holi. The usual Holi colors contain many chemicals whereas the colors the children made will not harm their skin and are environmentally friendly.

### Theater Workshop

Drama education supports the all-round development of a child. Engaging in drama as an activity helps children to identify new perspectives on a subject and express themselves freely. This process allows children to see the bigger picture in various contexts and develop problem-solving abilities. To this end, a drama workshop was organized with 20 children in May and June in partnership with Natyansh Sansthan. The group prepared a play about child labor, which they presented in the drama festival organized at Maharashtra Bhavan.

# Bringing Quality Education to Dang: Gyanodaya Project

## Collaboration: National Stock Exchange Mumbai

To improve the educational level of children, it is necessary to bring innovation in the classroom and changes in the educational methods. The main objective of the Gyanodya Project has been to improve, upgrade, and update the education system, in which we can see third grade children who are unable to read first-grade level books nor are confident asking questions. A secondary goal of the project is to develop 21st century skills in rural youth. Working in 450 schools with 22,500 children, this project is developing students' basic reading and arithmetic skills. To ensure student retention and bring sustainable change in the education system, parents, children, and teachers have been continuously engaged.

## Key Activities

1.	Selection of Education-Friends	37 youth were trained as Shiksha Mitras (Education Friends) and appointed in 75 schools. Each Shiksha Mitra was given the responsibility of connecting 30 students with quality education.
2.	Selection of Youth Volunteers	To strengthen the village education committees, 75 youth from local areas were identified and provided with leadership training to engage in these committees.
3.	CBE0 Leadership Capacity Development	An Assistant Project Officer was appointed at the block level to assist the departmental staff and to coordinate between the institution and departmental staff.
4.	Education Festival (Gyanotsav)	Shiksha Mahotsav was organised in 5 blocks of Karauli District to improve the learning level of students by bridging the gap between school and community.
5.	Integrated Audio Learning Program	By introducing a mini-30-minute audio educational series, children were engaged in joyful learning that supported the development of their listening skills, creative imagination, and self-learning skills.
6.	Encouragement Program	This program was conducted to promote a culture of well-being in the classroom so that both teachers and children can enjoy a stress-free environment in the classroom and be able to discuss problems as they come up.
7.	Gyanodya Learning Center (GLC)	With the aim of providing an educational environment for children in the community, 107 Gyanodya Learning Centers were established with the help of Shiksha Mitras and community members.
8.	Furniture Donations	14 high-need schools were selected and materials like tables, chairs, benches etc. were distributed.
9.	School Development and Management Committee Meetings	School Development and Management Committee meetings were organized in all the schools of Karauli Block and members were informed about their work and responsibilities.



## Schools Gain Access to Water Thanks to the Efforts of Shiksha Mitra Sujata

Shiksha Mitra, Sujata, was working in an upper primary school when she noticed one day that the hand pump in the school premises was not working well, a lot of dirty water was coming out of the pump. After speaking with the headmaster, she came to know that this problem had gone unaddressed for the last three years. The headmaster, Mrs. Sushila Mali, informed Sujata that many of the children suffer from stomach aches due to this water and that most of their families must walk 3-4 kilometres from home for drinking water.

Taking immediate action, Sujata and Sunita (in first paragraph name is Sushila??) contacted Shri Ram Niwas Meena and shared the concern. Mr. Meena pledged his support and agreed to find a way to provide water with the support of a government program that promises “providing fresh water to every village and household.” Under the scheme, the handpump was repaired and now the students and school staff have access to fresh, clean water.

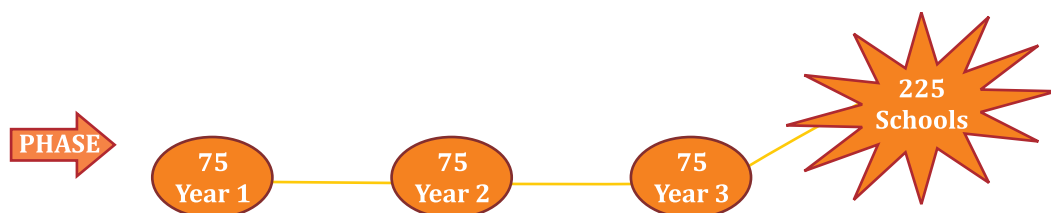

## Preparing for the Path of Education: The First Step

### Collaboration - Echidna Giving and Give to Asia

In November 2022, this project began in collaboration with the Integrated Child Development Services Department to improve the delivery of department services in 288 anganwadi centers in 2 blocks of Rajsamand District, Deogarh and Amet. Under the project, the importance of sending local children to school is being emphasized by activities aimed at improving the quality of pre-school education in the anganwadis and further extending community outreach about early childhood care and education.

The project aims to strengthen early childhood development by reaching out to children in between the ages of 3 and 6 as well as their service providers in 275 anganwadis. To this end, a plan has been made that consists of conducting capacity building programming for teachers to improve the child-friendly services of the anganwadi centers as well as introducing innovative educational methods for early childhood education.

### Preparatory Activities

#### Assessment of the Current Situation of the Children

Tools have been prepared to conduct a field survey to collect baselinedata about pre-schoolchildren in the age group of 3-6 years associated with anganwadis. Through this survey the current conditions of the centers and the children will be studied and assessed.

#### Constitution of Project Advisory Committee

A committee of subject experts has been constituted to provide guidance and ensure the effective and smooth implementation of the project. The committee will work closely with the project team to provide any needed support.

#### Project Team Selection and Capacity Building

A two-day orientation was held for the selected project manager, subject experts, block coordinators, field workers, and evaluation manager. The orientation covered all aspects of pre-school education and methods to enhance learning for this age group including how to organize activities in line with the curriculum of the anganwadis.

## 24 x 7 Emergency Services for Children in Distress: Childline Rajsamand

### Collaboration - Ministry of Women and Child Development and Childline Foundation

This project was started by Jatan Sansthan on April 18, 2016 in Rajsamand District to provide immediate help to children in emergency situations. Childline not only responds to emergency calls related to or from children in the moment, but also takes actions to ensure a better future for children by collaborating with and raising awareness amongst partners, including the District Child Welfare Committee and the Police Administration.



### Project Activities

Childline celebrated a week of awareness raising activities focused on child protection and child safety from 14-20 November 2022 under the banner of "Befriending Childline." As a part of these activities, officers of the Child Welfare Committee as well as from the District Police were invited and symbolically linked with Childline and child protection by tying rakhis, or surakhsha bandhan, on their wrists, a strong cultural symbol of commitment and protection. A programme called "Ashu Speech" was organized at Dwarkadhish Girls College, Doomkheda and Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya, Railmagara. Additionally, a dialogue was organized about Childline's role in Bal Mitra Vidyalaya in Delwada block and a program on child abuse and exploitation was organized in Government Senior Secondary School, Amet. At the Government Girls Upper Primary School in Deogarh, poetry and essay competitions were organized on child safety. Finally, the safety week concluded with activities at Govardhan Vilas Government English Higher Secondary School in Nathdwara.

On World Day Against Child Labor, June 12, 2022, Childline partnered with the District Legal Services Authority, Rajsamand, to host an open discussion on the prevention of child labor at the Kankroli bus stand. A signature campaign was organized at the same time, taking an oath from hundreds of people to not engage in child labor.

### Getting to Know Gandhi Better

In remembrance of the Father of the Nation, Gandhi Jayanti was celebrated by Jatan Sansthan in collaboration with the District Legal Services Authority on October 2, 2022. A dialogue was held on the main non-violent movements led by Gandhi and later the film "Gandhi" was played.

### International Day of the Girl Child

On January 24, 2023, International Day of the Girl Child was celebrated at Ra. U. Pra. Vi, Mora. In the program, poems were presented by the children and they were informed about Childline services. The team also discussed the concepts of good and bad touch with the children.

### Division Level Child Protection Workshop

A divisional level workshop was organized on the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act 2012 and the Juvenile Justice Act 2015. Many government officials and other stakeholders were present at the workshop including the Assistance Director of Child Empowerment Department, the Chairman of the Child Welfare Committee, members of the Juvenile Justice board, Childline members, the Child Marriage Prohibition Officer and the nodal officer working at the division level, the Secretary of Child Empowerment Department, Jaipur, the Minister of Child Empowerment, Jaipur, and the District Collector, Udaipur.

## CRC Child Protection Workshop

A state-level capacity building workshop was organized by Childline India Foundation to develop a clearer understanding of child protection issues under which legal provisions such as the POCSO Act 2012, the Prohibition of Child Marriage Act 2006, the Child Labour Prohibition Act 1989, the role and functions of a support person, and the Juvenile Justice Act 2015 were explained as well as public welfare schemes.

## Childline District Volunteer Workshop

A one-day Childline Volunteer Workshop was organized by Childline in Khamnor Block in which 42 volunteers participated. They were given information about child protection and discussed the role of volunteers in society.

## District Level Advisory Committee: Meeting CAB (Child Advisory Board)

Meetings of the Child Advisory Board were organized 3 times this year. In these meetings the work, challenges, and achievements of Childline were presented to all present, including the District Collector, District Level Officers from various departments, representatives of voluntary organizations, and other stakeholders.

## Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav Campaign

On the occasion of Independence Day, August 15, 2022, as a part of the Azadi ka Amrit campaign talks were held with schools and MGNREGA workers in 10 gram panchayats of Amet block of Rajsamand District. These talks were meant to raise awareness about child marriage as well as take oaths against child marriage. More than 3000 people committed to not participating in child marriage.

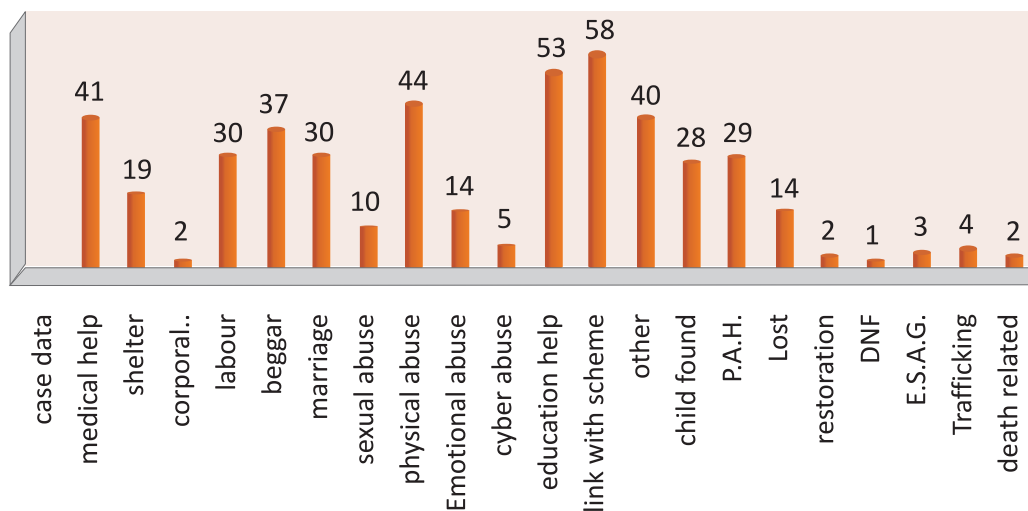
## Child Marriage Free India

In collaboration with Kailash Satyarthi Children Foundation, Jatan Sansthan conducted awareness raising activities about child marriage in 34 villages of the 3 blocks of Rajsamand District, Khamnor, Railmagra and Rajsamand. With the support of the District Legal Services Authority and Child Welfare Committee, local communities were engaged in discussion about the prevention of child marriage and took oaths to not conduct child marriage.

## A Gift for Me Campaign

Through the donations of local business families in Rajsamand District and the support of Childline, sandals were distributed to 600 children in slums and school supplies were distributed to 250.

## **Child Labor Free Rajsamand**

The Human Trafficking Cell with the support of the District Legal Services Authority and local police stations visited brick kiln factories and hotel-restaurants in Rajsamand and freed children from labor at these businesses. 13 cases were registered against the employers.

### **Outreach**

Activities were hosted in the 8 blocks of Rajsamand District to increase awareness about child protection. In each block night chaupals were held, slogan writing was completed, pamphlets were distributed, and information about the Childline number 1098 and Childline services were shared in schools and panchayat offices.

Number of phone tests conducted this year - 327

Number of cases received through outreach this year - 65

### **Leaving behind Labor & Returning to Studies**

One day the Childline center received a call regarding a child whose mother had gotten re-married, leaving him behind with his father, but his father had left, abandoning the child. The caller reported that the child now lived with an aunt and uncle who often beat him and forced him to do all the household work. The child also stopped going to school and the aunt and uncle had begun sending him to do labor. Though the neighbors witnessed the whole situation, they remained quiet, fearing potential aggression from the child's aunt. One day, an older girl from the child's school was passing by the child's home and witnessed his aunt beating him badly. The girl called 1098 and informed the Childline team about the child's condition. The team immediately went to the child's home and began explaining to the child's aunt and uncle how they could not abuse a child this way. The team saw how shocked the child was; he was saying that he did not want to stay with his aunt. Quickly, the team took the decision to rescue the child and provide him with shelter. Soon, the team ensured the child was admitted back to school, joining class 7 in the Ajmer Residential Hostel School.

### **Childline Stops Trafficking of a Girl Child**

One day the Childline team received a call from the 1098 hotline. The girl reported that her mother was trying to send her with a boy in exchange for some money. The girl said she had refused to go, so her mother started beating her. To escape, she waited for her chance and ran away into the jungle to hide. She was calling them on 1098 from a phone she had borrowed from a stranger she met to report her problems and ask for help. The team tried to speak more with the girl but could not succeed. Meanwhile, the girl's mother and aunt had found her in the jungle, took her home, and started beating her again. Though the Childline team was located 60 kilometers from Bhim, the area where the call had come from, they inquired along the way to locate the village and ultimately the girl's aunt's house. Even after arriving there, they could not ascertain any information about the girl. Feeling unconvinced by the family, the team decided to search the room and found the girl locked inside of a chest. She was immediately rescued by the team and brought to the police station. The girl herself narrated her past and what had happened. She was given shelter while a case under section 79 of the Juvenile Justice Act was registered against her mother.



## Udaipur Railway Childline

The Railway Childline project has been running since November 2018 to support and protect children in distress at the Udaipur City Railway Station. The work area of the Udaipur Railway Childline covers Udaipur City Station, Rana Pratap Nagar, Debari, Khemli, Bhimal, Mavli, Kheroda, Fatehnagar, Vallabhnagar, Bhinder, Kanod, Banshi-Boheda, Thamla, Mogna, Umra, Kharwa, Zawar, Padla, and Jaisamand areas.

From April 2022 to March 2023, a total of 1628 calls were received, of which 388 calls required intervention and immediate action. Of these, 247 cases were of boys and 141 were of girls. Apart from Udaipur District, cases came up for children from across Rajasthan including children from Bharatpur, Baran, Chittor, Ajmer, Rajsamand, Bhilwara, Kota, Banswara, Nagaur, Dungarpur, Karauli, Bikaner, etc while other cases came from other states including Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Jharkhand, Chattisgarh, Delhi, Maharashtra and Haryana. In these cases, the Childline team persuaded the children that it is better to return home and helped to send them home.

Activities Organized by Udaipur City Railway Childline

#### 1. Open Forums

Twice every month an open forum group discussion is organized by the Railway Childline in the slum settlements near the railway station. In these discussions, children from the slums can share their problems and help identify the key issues in their settlements. A total of 22 such forums were hosted between April 2022 and March 2023.

#### 2. Public Outreach and Popularizing of the 1098 Hotline

Activities were organized for children across Udaipur including at: Udaipur Station, Rana Pratap Nagar

Station, Khemli, Debari, Bhimal, Mavli, Fatehnagar, Umra, Kharwa, Bansi, Kheroda Station, Bhinder Station, Badi Sadri, Bhilu Rana Kachhi Basti, Mavli, Samidha Bal Griha, Sukher Bal Griha, Apna Jatan Kendra, Indra Colony, Machala Mangra, Chetak Circle, Municipal Corporation, Javarmines, Fatehsagar, Rajiv Gandhi Park, RPF Police Station, GRP Police Station, and Mavli GRP Police Station. To inform children at all these locations about Childline, the team organized a variety of recreational and sports activities and shared information about the 1098 hotline and other services.

### **Community Outreach**

This year outreach efforts were made on a wide scale including: 57 community outreach activities, 26 small outreach activities, 21 individual outreach efforts, and 301 night outreach activities. Through these activities, information about Childline was shared with station staff, auto drivers, passengers, anganwadi workers, porters, police station staff, and residents of the slums near the railway station.

### **Child Empowerment Week**

The November 2022 "Befriend Childline" week was inaugurated by the Railway Regional Officer and the RPF Police Station. A program then was organized at a school near the railway station along with a signature campaign on Platform No. 1 of the station. A sport competition also was organized in Rana Pratap Nagar while a drawing competition was organized in Machala Magra.

### **Meetings with Child Help Desk**

A total of 4 meetings were held this year between the Childline team and the staff of the RPF/GRP police stations. The cases received by Childline, the work done by the Childline team, and the challenges being faced in the cases were discussed in these meetings.

#### **Meeting with the Udaipur District Collector**

The Childline team participated in 2 review meetings organized by the Udaipur District Collector Tarachand ji Meena. All kinds of data and information were shared in the meetings and important issues like missing children, child marriage, and child labor were discussed. In addition to these meetings, the team attended the nodal meetings, Collab meeting, and a government organized meeting held on the Day Against Child Labor where they discussed various issues concerning child protection.







**For Betterment of Adolescent Boys and Girls**

# Improving the Lives of Adolescents in Remote Areas by Improving Access to Quality Education: Digant Project

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## Collaboration - KshamtalayaSansthan and Educate for Life

The Digant Project has been launched in the schools of Mandwa and Jhed panchayats in the Kotra region of Udaipur District. The aim of the program is to provide academic support and guidance to high school students to support them in completing high school, as well as to raise awareness about the importance of education in the local government departments and with parents to ensure the community maintains a well-functioning educational system.

Under this project, education coordinators use activity-based teaching methods to support the social, emotional, and moral development of students during their educational journey. The goal is to ensure students' finish their secondary education with a strong grasp of arithmetic, life skills, digital literacy, and basic knowledge. Additionally, education coordinators promote motivation and self-confidence in students through meaningful activities, ensuring that students remain connected to education even after completing the secondary level.

## Major Achievements

- During the 2022-23 academic year, a total of 312 students were enrolled in both schools. Of these, 206 students were enrolled in the Mandwa school whose attendance ranged between 50-75%. 106 students were enrolled in Jhed with the same attendance rate of 50-75%.
- In the 2022-23 year, the Jhed Secondary School conducted activities and lessons to support the interests of the students along with focusing on increasing community awareness about education. Connecting with the local community proved to be a challenge, but consistent engagement, regular communication, and parents' meetings succeeded in building a connection with the community over time. With this foundation, the team worked to strengthen the relationship with the community and raise awareness about the importance of education. At the beginning of the year only 3-5 parents would attend parents' meetings, but by January 2023 26 parents attended the first parents' meeting of the year.
- The result of the 12<sup>th</sup> class for Jhed Secondary School in 2022-23 was 100%.

In 2022-23, 206 students were enrolled in Mandwa Secondary School, of which 90% passed. 106 students were enrolled in Jhed Secondary School, of which 94% passed.

- To provide capacity building opportunities to the students, an All-Around Development Festival was held. A variety of activities were hosted in the festival including essay writing, riddles and puzzle events, dance, music, and sports.
- Class 10 students from Mandwa and Jhed were taken to visit ITI College where the principal informed them about the process of receiving training at ITI, the career fields, job opportunities, and the admission process.



## Effective Community Engagement and Discussions about Gender in Schools

### Collaboration - UNICEF Jaipur and Rajasthan School Education Board

Under the guidance and support of UNICEF, the Education Department's Gender and Community Engagement Department is working to provide technical support to schools in Rajasthan. Immediately after the state-level guides were updated and key reference persons were trained, efforts to ensure the participation of local people in education began in Dungarpur District by organizing education fairs and activating the school development and management committees.

#### Main Activities

- Education fairs were organized in 41 schools of Dungarpur District to provide career guidance to adolescents, which the students found very helpful. The students could access up-to-date information related to careers and were given useful links including the link to the Rajiv Gandhi Career Portal, where they can satisfy their curiosities and inquire and explore possibilities of different life paths.
- On Children's Day, 14 November, a district level painting exhibition on the theme of "Stop Violence" was organized and awareness raising about gender issues was conducted at GepSagar Pal in Dungarpur District. 2895 students from 47 schools participated in the school level painting activities. Awards were presented for the best submissions at both the district and school levels.
- After holding meetings with the School Management Committees and School Development Management Committees, the committees were regularized for 30 schools. In schools where these committees were not active, new members were selected and the committees were reconstituted.
- **District Level Dissemination Workshop**

A district level dissemination workshop was organized to share and expand the experiences of Shiksha Melas and take the concept to other districts of Rajasthan. District and block level officers attended the workshop, in which the learnings made from 41 education fairs as well as from volunteer collaboration, teacher trainings, and running of baseline surveys were shared. During the workshop a demo of exhibitions organized in schools was displayed as well as a photo exhibition and the display of feedback and project-related documents.



## State Level Technical Support

In collaboration with the Education Department (SamagraShiksha), a total of 211 teachers were trained on topics such as gender, girl education, positive masculinity, Gargi Manch management, and Kishori Mela organization.

The frameworks of the gender and “We are Classmates, We are Participants” sessions were shared with the REI partners of the Education Department and also included in the regular module. In addition, the team helped prepare state level guidelines for girl education and the School Chalo Abhiyan (Back to School Program).

To strengthen and regularize the School Management Committee and School Development Management Committee, 218 state level key reference persons were selected and trained.

As per the National Education Policy, a training guide was prepared to provide trainings to school-level volunteers. Along with this, 219 key reference persons were trained at the state level to support and provide trainings.

The team provided technical support in preparing guidelines for School Management Committees, School Development Management Committees, volunteers, AapniLado, Children's Day celebrations and teacher-parent dialogue.

Training was provided for the Community Cells and SAMSA in the 33 districts of Rajasthan to develop guidelines on these subjects. This training was designed to establish a foundational understanding of how to set up learning corners, how to empower the School Management Committees and the School Development Management Committees, and how to train volunteers and establish them as trendsetters. 166 state level key persons including 5 women teachers attended the training.

151 state level reference persons, including 51 women teachers, were selected and trained for the empowerment of adolescents. In the training, the importance of paying special attention to gender equality, organizing education fairs (career guidance), and the safety of children in schools was emphasized.



## Gender and Positive Masculinity Talk: Working with Rural Adolescents

### Support – Various Partner Organizations and Self-Supported

Jatan's efforts to inspire gender sensitivity amongst rural adolescents are as old as Jatan's inception. The institute began its work by forming adolescent groups and holding regular meetings and trainings. In all these efforts, special care was taken to make important issues like gender a part of discussing and building an understanding of any issue, therein beginning to bring topics such as gender into the mainstream. Continuing in this direction, in the current context, work is being done to increase the understanding and awareness of issues such as positive masculinity among adolescent boys and men and to advocate for such important issues.

### Main Activities

#### Training for Rural Adolescent Boys

A training was conducted for 35 male youth from the areas surrounding Railmagra with the objective of increasing their understanding of the concept of gender, motivating them to create an atmosphere of equality, and ensuring their participation in the work of equality by helping them to build a true understanding of the meanings of gender and masculinity.

A variety of engaging activities and training methods were used to increase the boys' knowledge on these topics. The teenagers prepared and performed plays on gender-based violence and discrimination prevalent in the society and later discussed this process and the issues presented.

#### Discussions on Behavior Change with Adolescent Boys

Our team organized a one-day discussion on the topic “Men, Masculinity, and Gender” for local teenagers at the Jal Devi Sthal of Sansera village in Railmagra. In the discussion, Manjari Pant and Sanjay Nirala from UNICEF, Jaipur as well as Sanjay Singh and Mary Jacob from UNICEF, Delhi facilitated dialogues on topics related to men and masculinity through focus group discussions. They also addressed various questions asked by the teenagers. In this session, the groups tried to understand the different symbols of men and masculinity through the lens of different aspects of the social systems. Teenagers from Madara, Gamerpura, Sansera, Jeetavas, Railmagra, Panotiya villages of Railmagra participated in the discussion.



## State Level Training Organized on Gender Equality for Key Reference Teachers

As a joint initiative, a state-level key reference person teacher training was organized in Jaipur by SamagraShiksha, Rajasthan School Council, UNICEF, and JatanSansthan. In this four-day training, 180 teachers split into 3 batches were trained to be trainers on teaching about gender equality.

Through a variety of interesting activities and discussions, expert trainers from UNICEF Jaipur and Jatan explored issues related to gender equality and positive masculinity with participants in the training. The main objectives of this process were to establish an understanding of personality development, safety, gender, and child rights and related laws in the education sector and to disseminate materials on these topics at the state level.



As boys, we are not held responsible for getting angry about many things, intimidating others without good reason, and trying to prove ourselves as right and good whether or not we are right. I realized for the first time that our environment is responsible for our behavior because it reminds us again and again that as men we can do as we wish.

Now I understand that in this world, it is better to become a good person than to behave as what we understand to be a man.

## Capacity Building for Partner Organizations

In August 2022, a 2-day training on Positive Masculinity was organized at Hunarghar Training Center for boys in the young men's group of the Ibtida Institute in Alwar. The training covered topics including self-knowledge, emotional intelligence, gender violence, body positivity, positive masculinity, and cyber safety. Through the training the young men's groups from the villages of Alwar and Madara in Railmagra Block were introduced to each other and had the chance to their share experiences.

A 3-day training on gender and masculinity was organized for the workers of Mahila Jan AdhikarSamitiSansthanin Ajmer from 27-03-2023 to 29-03-2023. An understanding of the concepts of gender, violent and positive masculinity, and how to present these topics to adolescents was built by engaging in a variety of activities including small and large group discussions, demo sessions, and role play.

JatanSansthan has been regularly holding meetings with adolescent groups formed in the villages of RailmagraBlock of RajsamandDistrict. In these meetings, boys get the chance to discuss behavior and their efforts to change. In one such meeting in Madara Village, subject expert Satish Singh ji joined and conducted a dialogue with the teens. The boys took this opportunity to ask Satish Singh ji questions on concepts related to gender.



## Teaching & Learning: Interns and Volunteers

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### Collaboration: Various Partners

Interns and volunteers at Jatan provide an opportunity for our team to further our learning and encounter new information as well as experience new techniques in action.

Interns and volunteers from a number of organizations visited Jatan this year and were able to see our work and activities up close while also providing their support in our efforts.

Under the Smile Internship program organized by PravahSansthan in Delhi, two interns, Kanchan Kashyap and Aqsa Areeb got an opportunity to see the activities of the Khushi project up close including the kitchen gardens, identifications of severely malnourished children and connecting these children with MTC services, assistance to pregnant and lactating women and understanding the various services available to them. After observing, the interns also got the opportunity to consult community members themselves.

Under the same program, interns Imran Nazeer and Digambar Kumar got in-depth information about the parent meetings, Anganwadi Management Committee meetings, and working style of the Gram Panchayat and community participation in the Khushi Project in Railmagara.

A study of the environment and culture of Pindwara Block in Sirohi District was carried out by interns Milind Soman and Shubham Awasthi from S.P. Jain Institute of Management and Research, Mumbai, as a part of the Reaching the Unreached Project. They also contacted the Health Department to get information about problems related to the COVID-19 vaccination process, which they then shared with the local team to improve documentation of the same.

Among other institutions, students from IIM Udaipur, Udaipur School of Social Work, Centre for Women Studies, and the Center for Human Development and Family Studies also did internships at Jatan and had the opportunity to learn about our work.





During my internship with Jatan, I learned countless things through seeing the efforts being made to change the lives of people, primarily by working on the health of children and women, through the Khushi project. I especially want to honor the women of Rajasthan for their consciousness of their role in society to improve the lives and futures of their families and society. Not only the women working in JatanSansthan, but also the women who are beneficiaries of the organization are a great example of change in society. Before coming to Rajasthan, like many other people, I held many misconceptions and prejudices about the women there -- that the women do not participate fully in the work of society at large or that they are not very aware about issues that affect their lives -- but I am happy to say that this internship broke these illusions for me and that is the greatest lesson I am taking back with me.

In the beginning of the year, Ruchika Tara Mathur, an Indian-origin student from the University of Galway, Ireland, came to JatanSansthan for support with her Ph. D. participatory research studies. Ruchika's study team included adolescents from Khadbamaniya village, who contributed significantly to the participatory evaluation of Ujala Clinic at the Community Health Centre at Railmagara. The study revealed some important insights that Ruchika shared at the Society for Research on Adolescents (SRA) Annual Meeting in 2023 in San Diego, US.

### **Interns from Other Institutions & Organizations**

**Break the Silence – Speak Freely:** On 28<sup>th</sup> & 29<sup>th</sup> March 2023, a menstrual health workshop was organized for the Yuva Mitra Sanstha workers from Nashik, Maharashtra at the Uger office in Udaipur.

**February 2023 –** Under the Udaan Project, a group of 20 students from the Synergy Foundation came for a field exposure visit to the JatanSansthan headquarters as well as Apna Jatan Kendra. During their visit, they attended a workshop on menstrual health conducted by Dr. Usha Chaudhary from the JatanSansthan team.

**February & March 2023-** Students of Nirma Institute of Design, J.K. Lakshmi Pat University of Design and Rishihood University of Design, Sonapat, Haryana, spent a week at JatanHunarghar in Khadbamaniya, Railmagara to observe and learn about rural culture.

**March 2023 -** A unique design workshop was organized by Lakshmi Murthy, Additional Director, JatanSansthan, for the students of design from J.K. Lakshmi Pat University, Jaipur and Nirma University, Ahmedabad from 28 March to 2 April 2023 in Udaipur. The workshop aimed to inform the students about different methods and strategies for social communication.







**For Empowerment of Women**

## For the Respect & Empowerment of Women

### Responsibility for Women's Nutrition and Health - Rajpusht

#### Support - IPE Global

This project is being run in the 2,563 anganwadicenters of Udaipur District for the following purposes: to reduce malnutrition in children, to reduce the infant mortality rate, to practically support the concept of taking extra care in the first 1000 days of the development of children, to counsel pregnant and lactating women and to bring about changes in social behavior practices related to their nutrition, and to identify malnourished children, connect them to hospitals and services available from the Women and Child Development Department, and ensure regular support for them.

#### Main Activities

Poshan Run –This activity was organized at the district headquarters in association with the district administration and ICDS Department. The run was flagged off by Kriti Rathod from the ICDS Department and other top district officials. Youth from each block participated in the Poshan Run Marathon and the top 3 winners were presented with mementos.

During the year 2022-23, about 48,000 women were supported to join the Pradhan Mantri Matritva Vandana Yojana and Indira Gandhi Matritva Poshan Yojana. Along with this, the women were counselled on how they should use the benefits received from this scheme to prevent malnutrition in their own children and ensure that the next generation born is healthy.

Rallies were organized at each anganwadi to raise awarenessconcerning nutritional issues. All public representatives at the panchayat level participated in these rallies.

Capacity building workshops on malnutrition were organized with ASHA and ANM at all the district development blocks. The workshops discussed new information related to local nutrition.

Based on the annual assessment of work progress, Bhagwati Lal ji, an institute activist and nutrition champion of Sarada Development Block, was selected and honored by IPE Global as the Poshan Champion of the Year 2022 for achieving the best results of the year.



## Uger: Menstrual Hygiene Management

The Uger unit of JatanSansthan is constantly striving to break the silence on the issue of menstruation and to clear any doubts related to menstruation. This unit works on the promotion of a better understanding of menstrual hygiene management, reproductive and sexual health as well as reproductive rights. Keeping in mind environmental cleanliness, Uger-brand sanitary napkins are made of cotton cloth and can be washed and reused. This product is a completely copy left product and can be used by anyone. Adolescent girls and women are trained to make these pads at home. At present, Uger has evolved into a reference unit that conducts training on menstrual hygiene management for adolescent girls and women in India as invited by various state institutions and organizations.

### Main Activities

The year began with the Uger team being invited to Gaya, Bihar and Kanker, Chhattisgarh by Water Aid to hold pad stitching workshops. Around 35 women attended the workshops at both locations and learned to sew 3 types of sanitary pads as well as a baby nappy.

This year, we had the opportunity to present the work of Uger on two special occasions at IDC and IIT, Bombay (School of Design, Indian Institute of Technology, Bombay). The first of these was the ACM Sigchi Conference (Association for Computing Machinery Special Interest Group on Computer-Human Interaction), while the other was a pre-PhD student seminar and a Post PhD consortium.

Compared to previous years, we experienced a slowdown at the Uger Unit. Both production and sales were low, but other activities compensated for this. We participated in fairs and programs organized by other organizations including the Eva Fair in Udaipur, Poshan Fair in Rajsamand, and the Azad Foundation Fair in Jaipur.

In collaboration with leading design institutes, JatanSansthan designs a special 5-to-6 day immersion course for students called the "Rural Immersion Program." This year a group of 3 students from J.K. Lakshmi Path University, Nirma Design University and Rishi University came to participate in the program. The immersion was held at the Hunarghar Training Center in Khad Bamania, Railmagra where the students had the opportunity to paint in a rural area as well as gain insights into local village culture and customs.



## Participation in ACCOR Take Off Challenge

The Accor Take Off Challenge is a worldwide student competition organized by Accor Hospitality Group, France. This competition gives students an opportunity to have their projects evaluated by teachers with different cultural backgrounds.

In 2021, 150 teams from universities in 25 countries from around the world joined. Students Subhash Ullal, Sadhika Venkatesh and Nathan D'Souza formed a team called the Conquistadors from the Welcome Group Graduate School of Administration, Manipal, India, and were shortlisted as one of the top 5 teams. Their project "Linens for Women" aimed at managing one of the largest sources of waste within the hotel industry. The main challenge was to find a good use for the linen cloth that is routinely thrown away at hotels. Team Conquistadores proposed that these fabrics could be used to make cloth sanitary pads, which could be distributed to low-income and marginalized groups to manage their menstrual hygiene. These people generally lack decent and hygienic options for menstrual management.

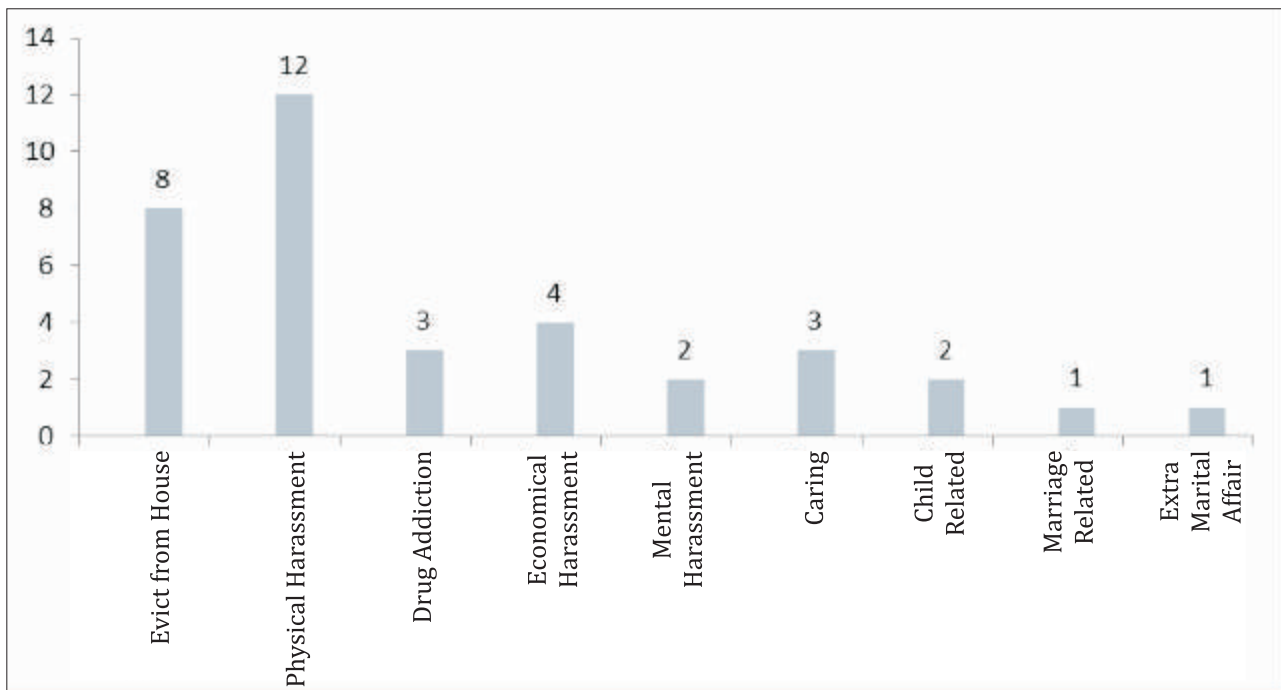
The team discovered JatanSansthan and our long-standing work on menstruation in their research and contacted our team for consultation on the feasibility of their proposal. The Uger team worked with them to make a series of sanitary napkin prototypes that were made exclusively from the discarded hotel linens. Team Conquistadors presented their final project at the International Closing of the ACCOR Take Off Challenge and they won! The team was awarded a trip to Paris, including a visit to selected ACCOR hotels, to receive the award certificate in November 2022. For this, Lakshmi Murthy of JatanSansthan, who guided the student group, was also invited to Paris.



## Resolving Family Conflicts: Family Counselling Centre, Railmagra

### Collaboration – Self-Funded

Jatan has been running a family counselling center on its own level in Railmagara for the last several years. To make the center self-sustaining, the workers are given regular training. A core team has been formed to operate the center, which is proving helpful in advising in resolving the conflicts families bring to the center.



### Pushpa, Freed from Shackles

Upon seeing the following headlines, "A shackled, disturbed woman is forced to spend the night in the forest," "Disturbed woman and son sent alone in ambulance to Udaipur, as they were not admitted to the hospital, they had to return to Dariba," and "Ambulance driver, on duty for the first day, is suspended for taking 300 rupees of expenses from the woman's son," a few local residents and local officials took immediate action to resolve the issue.

The District Collector took special interest in the case and instructed the officials to ensure the treatment of the woman. The SDM and Tehsildar restricted officers from carrying out the treatment of the woman and instead handed the responsibility of taking care for her over to the Jatan while taking an update of her condition every day.

Along with the rest of the JatanSansthan team, team member Sumitra Menaria monitored the woman three times a day for about 20 days and ensured her proper treatment, staying in continuous touch with the doctor. In these 20 days, the woman was given electric shock thrice along with medicines. After continuous treatment, her health showed improvement and the doctor discharged her from the hospital with instructions to get a health check-up done again every 15 to 20 days.

### The Problems Still Are Not Over

After being discharged from the hospital, the woman continues to face many problems. According to some sources, this woman married twice. The woman has two sons and a daughter from the first husband and a son from the second marriage, who lived with her in the temple of Awara Mataji in Sansera. Taking this son, she left her first husband, son and daughter in the village.

For about 14 years, time passed as the woman lived with her second husband in various temples. Meanwhile, the woman's mental condition deteriorated and both husbands died. Now, she is living with her son and daughter in Mavli village.

## Working Against Violence Against Women: Women's Safety and Advisory Centre

### Collaboration - Department of Women Empowerment

In Dungarpur District under the support and guidance of the Women's Empowerment Department, the Women's Advice & Protection Center is operating in the Women's Police Station to counsel women as well as provide legal aid as required. For this, two consultants have been appointed by Jatan, one of which is a social work expert and the other is a lawyer. Before taking any legal action, priority is given to sitting down with both parties together to ensure that any misunderstandings are cleared and to try to bring a peaceful settlement.

He even took her 5-year-old child away from her. The team called the woman and her husband to the centre together to talk. The man admitted his mistake and promised to never beat her again. The two are now living happily together.



## Strengthening Panchayats: Panchayati Raj Empowerment Program

### Collaboration: Azim Premji Foundation India

After the 73rd constitutional amendment, villages were put in control of their own development under the auspices of the gram panchayats. Since that time, development in villages has gained momentum, but awareness of the laws and processes continues to be lacking in elected, local public representatives and members of the gram sabha. Thus, it is important to work on awareness at the grassroots level.

Since the beginning of January 2023, in collaboration with the Azim Premji Foundation, JatanSansthan is regularly engaging the panchayat public representatives of RailmagraBlockas well as developing wider awareness in the Gram Sabha by forming an awareness forum.

The awareness forum works as a bridge between the elected officials and the public. According to need, 14 gram panchayats of Railmagra were selected for the project. In the selection process a variety of criteria were taken into consideration including the presence of SC, ST, OBC and women panchayats, remote areas, areas that lack good transportation, previous connections with Jatan, and connection with the legislative assemblies.

Information was collected through a baseline survey to assess the socio-economic and governance activity of public representatives, sarpanches, and ward panchesas well as to understand the role the public is playing in the selected panchayats. This survey also collected information about the jurisdictions of the panchayat and any development schemes already being engaged.

In all the panchayats, awareness forums are being constituted to take forward and monitor the work of development, to ensure the participation of the deprived and backward people as well as women. To this end, the process to identify active members of society in each panchayat and form these groups began.

The awareness forums in all the panchayats of the project are working to increase the participation of deprived communities.

To run the project effectively, staff with significant experience working with the Panchayati Raj system were selected. These staff were provided with further capacity building sessions and then assigned the responsibility of working in Panchayats as well as establishing relationship with the departments related to Panchayati Raj.

## Another Opportunity: COVID- 19 Vaccination - M- RITE

### Collaboration – USAID and JSI

Under the M-RITE project, in Udaipur, Banswara, Dungarpur and Sirohi, activities to create awareness about measures that should be taken to prevent the spread of COVID-19 as well as efforts to increase the rate of COVID-19 vaccination were undertaken targeting communities that generally fall beyond the reach of the local government departments. The objective of the program has been to increase both the rate of vaccination in the local communities as well as to increase awareness among people about misconceptions that have spread about vaccination. It also aims to improve vaccination distribution in four selected tribal districts by collaborating with the government to ensure access in remote areas. To achieve these goals, 6,000 local level volunteers were engaged and trained. The project team engaged with people at the village, town and panchayat levels with the support of locally influential people in addition to organizing a variety of activities in coordination with the local Health Department. The ultimate success was that 4,50,792 people came and were vaccinated at the vaccination camp organized as a part of this project.

### Awareness Raising Activities

#### Awareness Rath

Areas with low vaccination rates were identified by consulting local medical and health officials and a strategy was made to target the areas. Considering the remote nature of the region, an Awareness Rath, or walking campaign, which included a vehicle that played awareness messages and songs in the local language, was organized to encourage people to get vaccinated.

#### Street Plays, Puppet Shows and a Night-Long Program



To create awareness amongst local people in the region and connect them to the program, street plays, which reached hundreds of people, were performed. During the project period, puppet shows were performed mostly in and around schools to create awareness amongst 12-to-17-year-olds. With the help of the bahrupiye, populations in remote areas were successfully reached. Bahurupay played an important role in raising awareness amongst local people about vaccinations by going door to door in the project area. Similarly, organizing night programs was also very effective by helping to establish rapport with people in the community who work out of the village during the day as laborers or in the fields. In these programs, people are gathered at one place at night and discussions are held about getting the Covid vaccine and any doubts participants have related to it.

### **Children's Fairs**

To connect children with this vaccination campaign, more than 300 fairs were organized in schools. In collaboration with the Health Department, schools were selected for the fairs where less than 50% of the children were vaccinated. In these fairs, children were connected to vaccination services by organizing activities that explained the COVID-19 epidemic, its prevention and vaccination.

### **College Programs**

Through a variety of dialogues and debates, efforts were made to create awareness about COVID-19 and connect students with vaccinations in more than 20 colleges of the four districts. Students were also encouraged to go to the nearest vaccination centre on holidays to offer their services as volunteers.

### **Dialogues with Spiritual Leaders**

Even today in many rural communities, religious permission is considered mandatory to start many initiatives. Keeping this in mind, meetings were held with more than 250 religious leaders / gurus to speed up the vaccination program. This had a strong effect on the local people: when the gurus presented a positive view on the issue of vaccination in their meetings, the people immediately felt that their doubts were resolved.

### **Collaboration with Partner Organizations, Clubs and Government Departments**

As a part of the project, awareness programs were planned and put into action in collaboration with grassroots organizations that have a strong network on the ground. Camps were also organized with the support of and at the workplaces of the Lions Club, Field Club, Narayan Seva Sansthan, Ashan Dham Ashram as well as at government departments including the electric department, post office and banks.

### **Special Events on Special Days**

In collaboration with various local stakeholders in Neemach Kheda Kachchi Basti of Udaipur, the "Victory over Rumors" program was run on the festival of Dusshera. Various rumors related to vaccination were written on colorful papers, pasted on an effigy of Ravana, and burned with the effigy as part of the festival.

**Women's Day** -- To celebrate Women's Day on 8 March 2023, Jatan collaborated with the Health Department to gather and honor 100 front-line women workers including Asha and Anganwadi workers, who performed their duties excellently during the Covid-19 epidemic. These women were recognized and honored in person by the top officials of the Health Department.

**World Health Day** -- On the occasion of World Health Day on 2 April 2022, panchayat level vaccination camps were organized and unvaccinated villagers were linked to vaccination services. Information about Covid-19 was also shared, including the importance of 2-weeks of isolation for an infected person.

**Experience Learning and Sharing-** On completion of the project, a learning and sharing workshop was organized in collaboration with Medical and Health Department, Udaipur. In this workshop, a platform was provided for field level workers and senior officials of the Health Department to interact and learn from each other. Officials that attended the workshop include: Udaipur District Collector Dr. Tarachand Meena, Chief Medical Officer Dr. Shankar Bamnia, District Reproductive and Child Health Officer Dr. Ashok Aditya, Horse Surgery Program Officer from JSIAshok Raisinghani, and Vijay Pal from USAID. The efforts made by JatanSansthan for the successful implementation of the project were appreciated by participants in the workshop and JatanSansthan was recognized with an award for providing departmental support and excellent work in the field of health services at the district level.

**Volunteer Tanisha Tanwarishonored** - Volunteer Tanisha was honored by Additional Secretary, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Rolly Singh (IAS) for reaching out to and vaccinating the highest number of people living in difficult conditions in the rural areas of Sirohi District.

Capacity Building Workshop for Jatan Members and Personnel - A special training for capacity building of Jatan's members and workers was organized by Jatan in collaboration with SamvitVikasSansthan, Delhi in October 2022. The training developed an understanding on the functions and role of board members, the vision and mission of the institution, objectives, steering committees, the administrative structure, financial and accounting arrangements, foreign aid provisions, and the operation of projects. Along with this, the external and internal structures of the institution were discussed and the rights, duties, and decision-making process of the workers were explained through various activities.

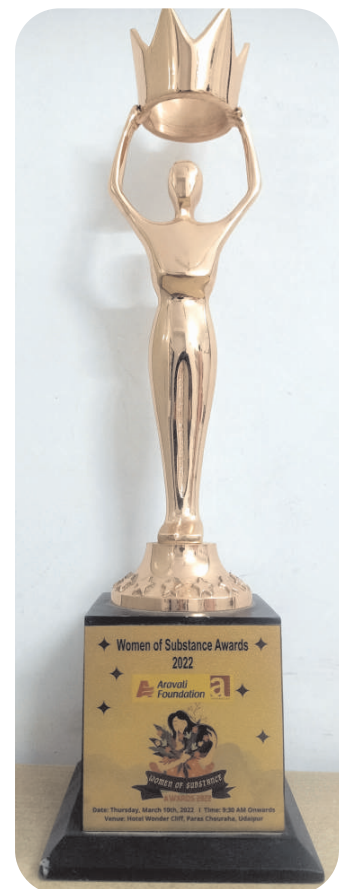

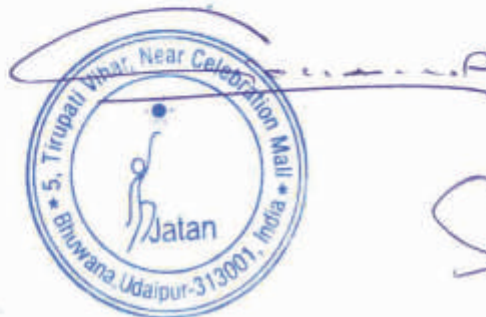
